Statement by H.E. Mr. Shinzo Abe, Prime Minister of Japan

at the Opening Session

High-Level Meeting of the General Assembly on Nuclear Disarmament

26 September 2013, New York

Mr. President,

Distinguished Representatives,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

At the outset, I would like to begin by expressing my sincere congratulations to His Excellency

Ambassador John William Ashe on his assumption of the Presidency of the Sixty-Eighth

Session of the United Nations General Assembly. I also would like to take this opportunity to

convey my profound gratitude to His Excellency Ambassador Vuk Jeremić as President of the

Sixty-Seventh Session and to those who contributed to the successful convening of this

esteemed meeting. Indeed, this is the first High-Level meeting focused on nuclear disarmament

within the United Nations General Assembly, and I am highly honored to be given an

opportunity to address all of you during this Opening Session.

Mr. President,

Japan is the only country which has ever suffered from the devastation caused by the use of

atomic bombs in wartime. We know from experience the aftermath caused by the use of nuclear

weapons and their elimination has been Japanese people's unwavering aspiration since the end

of World War II. For my part, I participated in the commemorative peace ceremonies held this

August in Hiroshima and Nagasaki where I renewed my strong determination to achieve "a

world free of nuclear weapons".

Mr. President,

"A world free of nuclear weapons" is a major goal not only of Japan but shared by mankind. At

the same time, however, in reality a massive number of nuclear weapons still remain and in

some areas nuclear arsenals are supposedly increasing with a lack of transparency. Considering

nuclear terrorism by non-state actors and the nuclear development by the Democratic People's

Republic of Korea (DPRK), the nuclear risk we face is more diverse and challenging than what

we encountered in the Cold War Era.
